MIDDLE STATES Re-Accreditation Visit

On October 5th through October 8th, St. Francis welcomed three professional educators who arrived to our campus and served as the Visiting Team for the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools. The Commission on Elementary Schools for the Middle States Association serves as the evaluative accrediting body that requires schools of our ilk to adhere to a strict protocol of standards in the following educational areas: Mission, Governance & Leadership, School Improvement Planning, Finances, Facilities, School Organization, Health & Safety, Educational Programs, Assessment & Evidence of Student Learning, Student Services, Student Life, and Information Resources.

For the past year and a half, the teachers, staff, students, and parents of St. Francis have contributed to the development of this reflective and visionary self-study. From their collective contributions, the faculty and staff utilized observational and supported data to create an Action Plan intended to further enhance the strength of program that we provide to our school families.

The Middle States visit began on October 5th with a "Welcome Dinner" for our Visiting Team that was generously prepared by alumnus Mr. Tony Triglia and was attended by members of the Steering Committee and our parish clergy. Following a student-led tour, the Visiting Team enjoyed a scrumptious "Dessert Reception" that was attended by parents, students, faculty, and staff. This special evening concluded with a professionally created video presentation that was produced by former SFdS parent Mr. Tom Taylor. This thoughtful production offered our Visiting Team a personal view on the profound impact that the St. Francis experience has on the lives of our school community members.

Throughout the remainder of their stay, the Visiting Team enjoyed a first-hand observation of a SFdS school day as the team moved from class to class. In addition, their schedule included interview meetings with students, faculty and staff, parents, the Steering Committee and the School Board. On the final day of their visit, the Middle States Visiting Team presented an oral report that praised the strength of our school program and applauded the unique spirit that permeates our campus. And at the conclusion of their final report, the Visiting Team shared without hesitation that they would recommend our re-accreditation to the Middle States Commission as a result of our thorough and complete fulfilment of all twelve of the standards set forth within the Excellence by Design protocol. Although the final determination of reaccreditation isn't rendered until the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools Commission reviews the final report, the recommendation from the Visiting Team confirmed the success of the reflective and evaluative assessment that we offered this process, as well as affirmed the Excellence in Education and Foundation of Faith that SFdS continues to provide to our school families as we have done for the past 65 years.

Andrew Welch Donates Materials, Time, and Talent to Build Stunning Prayer Cross

Each morning at St. Francis de Sales Catholic School, students and faculty come together in the Long Parish Center for our daily Community Meeting. The students sit in neat rows while a classmate leads the school in prayer. While the meeting leader rotates each week, our school day always begins with a reading from the Bible and the phrase "Today we celebrate God's word," regardless of who is selected.

The Community Meeting is the only part of each day that the entire student body gathers as one. It is a time when students can turn to fellow Penguins for comfort and hope: Students are given a chance to ask for prayers from the whole community. And thanks to SFdSCS parent Andrew Welch, we have a beautiful repository for these prayers.

Mr. Welch is a gifted carpenter. His skills have been honed over the years—Mr. Welch has been working with wood since he was 12 years old. When Mr. Costante stumbled across a picture of a wooden prayer cross, he immediately knew to call Mr. Welch with his idea. Armed only with the picture from Mr. Costante, Mr. Welch designed and built our prayer cross from oak and glass. From the front, the cross' workmanship is striking, and you'd never guess the elaborate trap doors it features in back. The cross is designed to open from





four such doors so that prayers can easily be "slipped in and retrieved," according to Mr. Welch.

Mr. Welch said that the hardest aspects of the project were the pane of glass and, unsurprisingly, the hinged doors. Now students at Saint Francis are putting those trap doors to good use. It won't be long before the prayer cross is filled, which makes Mr. Welch happy. Of the 20-30 hours he worked on the project, Mr. Welch said, "I enjoyed it because it was for the school."

SPOTLIGHT dr. jose alvarado

After 12 years of studying and working in Nashville, Tennessee, Dr. Jose Alvarado returned home to the Eastern Shore to practice medicine in 2012. For the past three years, Dr. Alvarado has served the children and families of Salisbury as a pediatrician. He acknowledges that it was a long road from St. Francis—he graduated in 1997—to the Vanderbilt University School of Medicine, but he's passionate about the work he does.

While many doctors say it was always their dream to don a white coat, Dr. Alvarado's career as a doctor is not quite what he envisioned for himself as an undergraduate. Dr. Alvarado earned a degree in engineering at Vanderbilt, then returned to his alma mater for medical school. He advises students interested in medicine that it's all right to forge an unconventional path to medical school. "Study what you like in college. You don't have to be a scientist to become a doctor," he said. "I get to see lots of kids and they ask me for advice. There's a lot of pressure to choose a profession. Figure out what you're good at and what makes you happy, and that will lead you in the right direction," Dr. Alvarado continued.

Dr. Alvarado's wife, Dr. Maria Maguire, underscores his point. Dr. Maguire studied comparative literature as an undergraduate student. The two met in medical school, and Dr. Maguire also became a pediatrician.

Building relationships with patients is one of the aspects of practicing medicine that Dr. Alvarado finds rewarding. So it wasn't a surprise to hear that when Dr. Alvarado thinks about St. Francis, he fondly remembers the commitment of his teachers. "At St. Francis the thing I remember most is that teachers are more like mentors. They're invested in you," he said.

In his free time, Dr. Alvarado enjoys golfing and playing darts, though his already limited free time is set to dwindle further in the next few months. Dr. Alvarado and Dr. Maguire are embarking on their next adventure together: They will welcome their first child in February. "I get to practice what I've been telling parents for the past three years," Dr. Alvarado joked.
